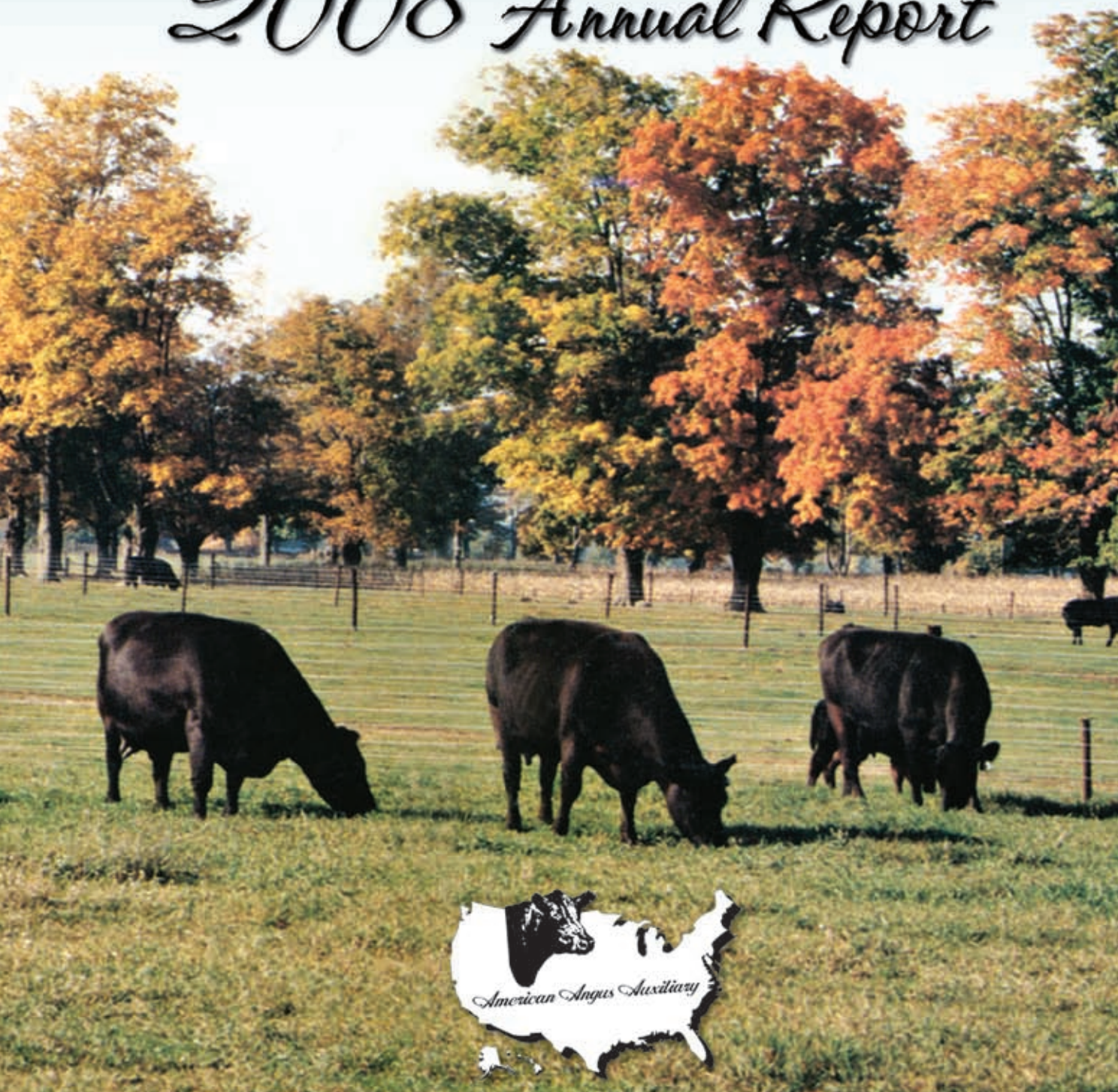

Scholarships

The Auxiliary scholarship program benefits outstanding Angus youth. Through the generous contributions of Angus breeders and supporters, we have once again been able to increase our scholarship amounts for 2009. Scholarships totaling \$15,000 will be awarded to five young men and five young women at the 2009 NJAS in Perry, Ga. First-place recipients will receive \$1,700; second place, \$1,600; third place, \$1,500; fourth place, \$1,400; and fifth place, \$1,300.

Scholarships are available to any current junior Angus member who will be graduating from high school in spring 2009, and who is pursuing a secondary education.

State scholarship contacts are listed in this annual report and also on our web site. Potential applicants should check with their state contact soon to learn of state deadlines. All applicants must first be judged on the state or regional level. Winning applications signed and submitted by the state contact will proceed on to the national competition.
