Executive board and executive committee structure explained

Many people have asked about the internal leadership of the American Angus Auxiliary. It can be confusing when you here the terms of Executive Committee, Executive Board, Committee Chairperson, etc. The officer team would like to explain how our leadership team is structured and give you a better understanding of the role each position has within the organizational structure.

Like most organizations, there is an officer team consisting of the Advisor, President, President-Elect and the Secretary/Treasurer. However, the American Angus Auxiliary has an expanded leadership team. The Executive Committee includes the elected Officers, Regional Directors and the immediate Past President and it is their role to transact business requiring immediate attention between meetings.

This group is followed by the Executive Board which is comprised of the Executive Committee members, the President of each state/regional auxiliary or an appointed representative from that state/region if the President is unable to serve. The representative is appointed by the President of state/region. Also, each unorganized state shall have a representative appointed by the American Angus Auxiliary President. This person will have the title of a Director at Large. In addition, the Chairmen of all national committees or in her absence a member and all past presidents of the American Angus Auxiliary will be members of the Executive Board. Only members of the Executive Board shall have the right to introduce a motion or vote at Executive Board meetings. Any member attending shall have the right of discussion.

There are also opportunities to serve as a Chairperson or member on one of the committees. The Standing Committees are as follows:

He is my rock, my inspiration, my love.

As for the million dollars I would become debt free, put enough money away for the boy's college education, and buy two kick butt Angus heifers

for the boys to show at NJAS. Then I would pay a few bills for others in need anonymously.

Adults attending the NJAS also participate in their own type of cooking competition. The Chef's Challenge is an event open to both older NJAA members (18-21) and adults, and participants showcase their skills using CAB and secret ingredients provided by the contest.
