A second objective was implemented. This time to insure and confirm that over 65 years of hard work and fund raising was secure, appropriately managed and transparent. That said, it became quickly apparent the necessary documents to reflect our mutual understanding had not been constructed. Quiet persistence has resulted in a document that defines a mutual understanding between the AAA and the Auxiliary for the management of our funds by the Angus Foundation. We are in good hands. The carousel has stopped, and the calliope music has been replaced with optimism, open communication, cohesiveness, confidence and solidarity. Thank You to Mark McCully CEO, Kenny Miller CFO, Rod Schoenbein Foundation Director of Development and many of the AAA Board of Directors for the many conversations that brought us to a pleasant and supportive mutual conclusion.

Several years ago, the Auxiliary started a campaign to obtain emails from our members and notified them to keep up with current standards digital transition was paramount and on the horizon. We have increased our Facebook postings and used Constant Contact for pertinent information. 2019 was the year to 'pull the plug' and make our first attempts of communicating with the members totally electronic. Another objective set in motion. Our first major electronic activity was the Spring POST. The majority of the members received their POST electronically. Under 400 letters were still sent through the mail because of no email address. These recipients were notified on their copy this would be their last hard copy and to submit their email for further communication. Only a small handful of email updates were received. Hard copies can still be sent upon request. This electronic transition has reduced postage expense and expedited communication. A win-win. The Fall Post will be our second run and each time we will improve and reduce the postage for hard copy mailing. This objective is not considered complete, but we get closer with each activity. Proposed By-Law Changes

Article IV Officers and Regional Directors

Section 4.1 The majority voting at the Annual Meeting shall elect the Officers and the majority voting from each region by mail-ballot shall elect the Regional Directors.

Section 4.2 President

4.2.5 Shall be an ex-officio member of all Committees except the Nominating and Scholarship Committees

Section 4.5 Regional Directors

Regional Directors shall be elected to serve a term of two years but no more than two consecutive terms. In order for terms to be arranged so that no more than three directors' terms shall expire annually and for one term only, the directors from Regions 1, 2 and 3 shall serve a two-year term and the directors from Regions 4, 5 and 6 shall serve a three-year term for those director positions elected in November 2010. If a Regional Director position becomes vacant, the newly appointed Regional Director shall complete the remaining vacated term. A Regional Director appointed to complete a vacated term may then be elected to no more than two consecutive terms after completion of the vacated term.

ARTICLE VII Standing Committees

Section 7.8 Scholarship Committee.

 The Scholarship Committee shall consist of eight members. The President-elect shall be Chair. The eight members shall be appointed nominated by the President-Elect and confirmed by the Executive Committee of the Executive Board and shall serve for a period of four (4) years with two members retiring and two new members appointed annually. In the event of a vacancy, an the individual appointed to fill the vacancy shall only serve the time represented by the remaining unexpired term of the vacating member the individual was appointed to replace.

ARTICLE VIII Nominations and Elections Section

Section 8.1 Nomination Committee.

For the election of Regional Directors, the Nominating Committee will 3. work with state and/or regional auxiliaries and members to recruit candidates for Regional Director. Members will have the opportunity to nominate a regional director candidate from their respective region. All-The names of nominees who consent to accept the position and complete an information form will go be placed on the Regional Director ballot. The ballots for each region electing a director will be mailed provided to the current official list of members in those regions and members will only vote for nominees in their region. The nominee receiving the largest number of votes shall be elected. The Nominating Committee Chair is responsible for issuing and counting the returned ballots. The Regional Director ballots may be issued and completed returned ballots returned may be provided by U.S. mail, electronic methods or such other method as approved by the Executive Board.

American Angus Auxiliary Mentoring Program

Each year, the American Angus Auxiliary puts together a mentoring program for juniors entering their last couple years of involvement in the National Junior Angus Association. The goal of the program is to pair protégés with mentors who can help guide them in those 'in-between' years. The women of the Auxiliary are experienced in a multitude of career paths coupled with the knowledge, connections, and passion to help prepare the college aged group for a successful future in both their personal and professional lives. The Annual Certified Angus Beef Cook-Off

Competition Heats Up

National Junior Angus Show hosts a culinary competition to encourage junior Angus members to create a Certified Angus Beef dish.

Junior Angus members and parents alike agree the *Certified Angus Beef*[®] (CAB[®]) Cook-off is one of the most highly anticipated contests held at the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS). In 1983 in Des Moines, Iowa, the first Cook-off was organized to encourage Angus juniors to practice their beef education skills while using ground beef. Later in 1988, the contest gained the support of *Certified Angus Beef*[®], and ever since, they have provided product to contestants. To add to the whimsy of the event, it was encouraged to create a theme, to dress and style the dish around, as well as prepare a presentation/skit for the judges focusing on the theme of the dish.

"The CAB Cook-off is a highly anticipated annual event that everyone in the family can get excited about," said Anne Patton Schubert, past American Angus Auxiliary president and one of the founders of the CAB® Cook-off. "Not only does this contest teach juniors to cook using the *Certified Angus Beef*® brand, but it also molds the exhibitors to be beef advocates at the dinner table."

Participants are to create a dish using the *Certified Angus Beef* [®] brand, and these dishes were separated into three divisions: steaks, roasts and other beef items. Beyond these categories, the junior members are divided into age groups: 8-13, 14-17 and 18-21, with groups of two to six, the age being determined by the oldest member of the team. Sponsored by the Beef Education Committee of the American Angus Auxiliary, this event requires an immense amount of teamwork and is a favorite of exhibitors, as well as families, due to its fun nature.

Eva Hinrichsen, Kady Figge, Clay Pelton, Kelsey Theis, Abbie Schwab and Nick Siemens were the overall winners at the 2019 National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) division, where they were able to wow the judges with their Molasses Spiked Steak recipe. This recipe uses CAB flat iron steaks marinated in a combination of spices and molasses and grilled to perfection.

The Black Kettle Award is given to the team with the highest score overall, among all different age groups. In commemoration of Paul St. Blanc, who was an avid Angus producer and cook-off enthusiast, this award was presented to Kansas in the Intermediate Steak division. The team appropriately chose the Kentucky Derby to coincide with this year's NJAS theme.

The CAB Cook-off Contest is an opportunity for all juniors to be involved in the activities of the show week, even if they do not have livestock to show. This opportunity is educational as well as fun for all juniors involved and will continue being a favorite competition throughout the upcoming years.

Describe your involvement with Angus Cattle, current and background.

I am a third generation Angus breeder and grew up learning about the Auxiliary. My first Auxiliary role was to help make sandwiches for the state sale with my grandmother who was a founding member of the Michigan Angus Auxiliary. I grew up through the National Junior Angus Association and enjoyed showing cattle at local, state and national events. What skills or talent can you bring to the organization?
