During Certified Angus Beef® Annual Conference, I had the opportunity to listen to a keynote address by Ken Schmidt, former director of communications for Harley-Davidson Motor Company. Schmidt's motivating presentation on branding, creating a fanatic customer base and developing leaders who inspire contained a key

phrase that he used to make his point. He said, "Don't leave without a story to tell", expounding that if there is no story then nothing happened. Your story can be sparked by a nice or engaging dinner conversation, a new friend met, something learned or experienced- big or small – there is a story to tell. After Schmidt's presentation, I began to think about what would be my story and what would be the story of current officers, members as well as of those the Auxiliary touched this year through our programs, awards, meetings or events.

As I end my year as president, I am excited to tell my story and the story of the Auxiliary's 60th year. It is a story that will be forever ingrained in me and will always be a very special memory. In the beginning of my term, I set personal goals as well as goals for my year as president. My number one goal was to bring a greater open awareness of the Auxiliary and to reach out to those that may not know our mission and purpose. At that time I was not thinking about "telling a story", at the end however we do have a great story to tell and share. Here is just a little of that story.

The story begins with the nine women that have served with me this year as officers and regional directors, while I am sure that each of them could tell their own story the story we can tell together is one of a successful and personally fulfilling year as we worked together to uphold the 60 year old mission of the Auxiliary. Each of these women brings unique talents, experience and perspectives while sharing a passion for our mission and Angus cattle that unite us together as a team. It continues with Miss American Angus 2012, Brooke Harward and the many committee chairwomen and committee members that have worked throughout the year to create the heart of our story. A big part of our story is our first- ever *Women Connected Conference* which we had last spring in St. Joseph, Missouri. Made possible by the sponsorship of the Angus Foundation and support of the America Angus Association, we connected with a diverse group of women from different regions of the country and backgrounds that are connected by and share common bond, Angus cattle.

By utilizing social media and our regularly updated website our story has been shared on a daily basis with the world. Fun and beautiful new items were added to the Angus Gift Barn and a partnership with Certified Angus Beef, LLC brought our *Gifts that Sizzle* program to new levels. With this new partnership our net income for the project this year was almost \$3000, a 438% increase over 2011. The May 14, *The Angus Report* on RFD TV was entirely about the Auxiliary featuring the *Women Connected* conference and our history as well as our scholarship, Miss American Angus, cook-off programs and more.

In June, we continued the tradition of selling a heifer during the All-American Breeders Futurity in Louisville. A bred heifer donated by Gardiner Angus Ranch, Ashland, Kansas was sold during the All-American Angus Breeder's Futurity for \$9000 to French River Cattle Company and Daisy Springs, Ontario, Canada. The entire proceeds of this sale have been invested in our scholarship and awards endowments. Collaboration with the All-American Angus Breeders' Futurity and the Angus Foundation for this project lends awareness of our organization and our mission .Our story is made more interesting through the generosity of our supporters.

Our story gained new pages during the National Junior Angus Show as we

coordinated our 29th annual All American Certified Angus Beef Cook-Off Contest and fourth Chef's Challenge Contest, awarded the 59th annual silver pitcher awards, presented our silver bowls to showmanship winners for the 45th year and honored junior Angus members with numerous other awards including \$12,000 in scholarships. We conducted scholarship and Miss American Angus workshops to a standing room only crowd and welcomed the membership to a social and mid-year meeting.

The final part of this story will be written in Louisville during our annual meeting, breakfast and 60^{th} anniversary reception; as well as with the induction of a Distinguished Woman and the crowning of the new Miss American Angus.

Perhaps most importantly our story as well as mine will continue with the renewal of old friendships and meeting new people that share our commitment to the Angus breed as well as the Auxiliary mission. As we moved forward as an organization we have many more chapters to add. I leave my year as president with simple challenge for myself, the Auxiliary officers, committee chairman and members, "Don't leave with out a story to tell" and tell that story. I have been truly honored to serve as the 60th president of the Auxiliary; this story is one that I will continue to tell.

French River Cattle Company Purchases Auxiliary Heifer

Support of Angus youth is a main priority of the American Angus Auxiliary, and thanks to French River Cattle Co. of Ontario, Canada, the purchaser of the 2012 American Angus Auxiliary Heifer, that support of youth scholarships and awards continues. The heifer was purchased for \$9,000 at the All-American Angus Breeders' Futurity in Louisville, Ky., on June 17. Tom McGinnis of Heritage Farm, Shelbyville, Ky., was the contending bidder. In addition to providing for many Angus youth through her auction proceeds, the elite female, GAR Progress M381, donated by Gardiner Angus Ranch of Ashland, Kan., also will serve as a start for a young girl's very own Angus herd. The heifer will be transferred to 11-year-old Selena Stronach and her farm, Daisy Springs, also in Ontario. Selena's father, Andy Stronach, and George McGaffin own French River Cattle Co. "At times, we have to look outside the box, from our own farms, families or businesses," McGaffin says. "By supporting the American Angus



Auxiliary and Angus Foundation, we give back to the breed in a manner that allows excellent work and efforts to continue. It certainly was an easy call for us when we could see and appreciate the quality of Mark Gardiner's fine donation." GAR Progress M381 is a daughter of GAR Progress, and she sold bred to GAR Prophet. Gardiner Angus Ranch also donated the transportation costs to the buyer's ranch.

"The reality is the American Angus Association®, the Angus Foundation and the American Angus Auxiliary—the whole team is so valuable," says Mark Gardiner of Gardiner Angus Ranch. "I feel my family wouldn't have survived without the support of this team, which allowed us to build a business to support our family. This is why we were happy to pull our weight and donate this heifer." Auxiliary President Anne Lampe says the sale of a heifer was reintroduced in 2011, after a several year hiatus, as "The Tradition Continues" project. "The American Angus Auxiliary's mission is further enhanced through the generosity of Angus breeders and supporters," Lampe says. "Collaboration with the All-American Angus Breeders' Futurity and the Angus Foundation for this project is exciting and lends awareness of our organization and our mission. We sincerely thank the donors, the Gardiner family, and the buyers, French River Cattle Co., for sharing our commitment to the Angus breed and its junior members." All proceeds from the auction will benefit the Auxiliary's scholarship and awards endowments, which the Angus Foundation maintains. The scholarship and awards endowments benefit 10 Auxiliary scholarships; the Crystal, Grote and Spader Awards; the Silver Pitcher Award; the Miss American Angus contest; the All-American Certified Angus Beef® (CAB) Cook-Off contest; and the National Showmanship Awards. The awards and scholarships are presented annually during the National Junior Angus Show. Women Connected Conference

In celebration of its 60th anniversary, the American Angus Auxiliary recently held the "Women Connected" Conference in Saint Joseph. Mo. Women



involved in the cattle

business, from throughout the country, joined together to engage with one another, empower leadership abilities and educate themselves about current industry topics. "We brought together such a diverse group of women involved in not only the Angus industry, but also the entire agriculture sector," says Anne Lampe, Auxiliary president. "The conference gave these women the chance to learn more about agriculture, themselves and their abilities to be advocates for the industry." Twenty-nine women from 15 states traveled to the Midwest for the weekend, April 14-16. They heard from a variety of speakers, participated in interactive workshops, and further developed leadership and teambuilding skills. Opening keynote speaker Suzy Graven, life and business strategy coach, spoke with participants about women's influence on the American West. They also heard from Lampe about the history and mission of the American Angus Auxiliary and the Angus Foundation, and their common goals of supporting Angus education, youth and research. Debbie Lyons-Blythe, Angus rancher from White City, Kan., shared advocacy tips for connecting with consumers and other women outside of the industry. The American Angus Association®'s public relations department also presented on how to navigate social media and take powerful photos for farm and ranch marketing. Participant Danval Coon, Rockport, Mo., is a member of the National Beef Speakers Bureau and says the social media advocacy portion of the conference better equipped her to share agriculture's story. "There is so much knowledge floating around out there, and with the information I was able to learn during the conference, I will be able to dig a lot deeper into my ag-advocacy blog and really be able to tell agriculture's real story," Coon says. "Ranching is not just a job, it's a lifestyle, and the only way we can connect is to put a face to the industry." Later in the conference, Marcy Heim, founder of The Artful Asker, shared techniques to empower participants as leaders in the beef industry. Heim also presented methods to encourage others to invest in organizational development. Participant Carla Malson of Parma, Idaho, says the information she received from the conference won't just stay in St. Joseph: "No matter what region the participants were from in the United States, we had more similarities than differences," Malson says. "I am really fired up to take new ideas from the speakers and other attendees back and fine tune them for my region and organizations." The conference concluded April 16 with a tour and informative breakout sessions of the Association and Angus Productions Inc. "At the end of the day, we were all excited about the knowledge everyone was walking away with," Lampe says. "We are excited to see the impact these women will bring to the Auxiliary and Angus industry."

Always a Queen

Its been said , "Once a Miss American Angus always a Miss American Angus." In celebration of our 60th year, we highlight one of our most visible traditions, the Miss American Angus program. The first National Angus Queen was crowned in 1967 after being awarded the first place Auxiliary scholarship, in 1973 the title was changed to Miss American Angus and in 1980 MAA was chosen from the top five scholarship winners in an interview and speech competition. I recently contacted those past queens with whom I have email contact with and asked them to share a few memories of the contest, their reign or how MAA affected their life. The response was great, in fact more than I expected for this limited space. During this milestone anniversary I chose to print all of what the very first queen shared as well as selected memories and reflections from others.

Sharon Harold Sommers- 1968-69. What an exciting moment for me when I received a telegram informing me I was the first place Auxiliary scholarship winner in 1968. Along with the \$600 scholarship I automatically was crowned the first "National Angus Queen." I have such fond memories of the ladies of the American Angus Auxiliary, especially Mrs. Willie Volkmann, Mrs. Evelyn Smith, and Mrs. Berl Priebe. They were such lovely, gracious ladies that made me feel very special. The outfit designed for me was a black velvet suit with a white lace blouse. Attending the International in Chicago was the highlight of my year as queen. The place, the people, and the cattle were just awesome. I had attended the show before, but to be sitting in the arena as the "National Angus Queen" was an experience beyond words. Other shows I attended included the American Angus Futurity, the American Royal, and the National Junior Heifer Show. I was thrilled to be the first gueen, but even more thrilled when my daughter, Jill Sommers Harker, twenty-five years later placed second in the Auxiliary scholarship contest and was also chosen as the Miss American Angus Queen. Jill also was elected to the National Junior Angus Board and served as the Communications Director. Jill, her husband Dan, and sons Luke and Chase live on a farm at Hope, Indiana, and raise and show Angus as well as other breeds. Our youngest daughter, Janelle Sommers Deatsman, was chosen as the first place American Angus Auxiliary scholarship winner in 1996. She was also elected to the National Junior Angus Board and served as chairman. She and her husband Brian and two sons, Collin and Landon, live on a farm at Leesburg, Indiana, and raise and show Angus in addition to other breeds. My husband, Dr. Richard Sommers and I live on a farm at Silver Lake, Indiana and maintain a small herd of Angus cows in addition to the Sommers Veterinary Clinic. We love to be a part of our grandsons lives, especially as they start their show careers. I have been active in the Indiana and American Angus Auxiliaries as well as local, district, and state Angus and beef cattle associations. Janelle, Jill, and I also served as advisors to the Indiana Junior Angus Association.

Nancy Diuble Thelen -1970-71. Nancy who served an Auxiliary president ins 2008 and currently chairs the finance committee wrote. My life has been devoted to young people and Angus cattle, and I believe deeply in the mission of the Auxiliary. I was elated and very honored, not grasping what a truly unforgettable experience was dawning that day in Kentucky. 1973 was the Centennial Year for Angus in America so in honor of George Grant who imported the first Angus from Scotland into Kansas, the Queen Committee chaired by Betty Johnson from Ohio, decided to have a kilt made in the black and white "Grant" plaid. That was my official outfit along with a matching hat, black boots and a beautiful leather banner that had Angus hair from the hide showing through. My most memorable event

was the World Angus Forum which the United States hosted that fall in Kansas City, Missouri. During the show, I got to lead each class in on horseback carrying the flags of all the different countries represented at the Forum. Kerri Votaw Kliewer-1977-78. I remember receiving the

call and just being "over the moon" with excitement. My sister Chris and I flew down to Louisville where I was crowned at the All American Angus Futurity. Now a jewelry wholesaler, I take every opportunity to promote Angus. My favorite question asked with the most sincerity is "what part of the cow is the Angus from"? It provides the perfect platform to promote Angus. Cindy Houck DeHoff- 1984. My memory of crowning was it was during the banquet and Art Linkletter was the guest speaker. He crowned me and was very dear...only other memory was they tied silver helium balloons to my chair the rest of the night. I was in shock and overwhelmed. Susan Quam- 1985. There were three components to the contest: A prepared speech, impromptu question and private interview with the selection committee. I remember having a great conversation with Glen Klippenstein about the problems with the milk pricing/marketing system at the time. Since I was from Wisconsin, he wanted to test my knowledge of other ag-related issues. Jill Sommers Harker- 1994. Miss American Angus gave me so much more than just a crown and sash. It allowed to me to travel the US and meet people that I have established friendships with that will last a lifetime. It changed me as an individual – gave me confidence, self-esteem, taught me how to speak on my feet, to promote agriculture and all that it stood for. Christy Bell Page- 1995. Serving as Miss American Angus opened up so many opportunities for me either through industry, making contacts or making like long friends. Serving as Miss American Angus strengthened my love for Angus cattle and the Angus breed and certainty knowing that I would remain involved in the Angus breed all my life. Jamie Meyer Rutledge- 1998. Dark Chocolate Fudge Sauce

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder

1/4 cup butter, cut up

1/4 cup buttermilk or 1/4 cup milk and 1 teaspoon lemon juice

5 oz. bittersweet chocolate, coarsely chopped

1 cup whipping cream or heavy cream

1/2 cup light-colored corn syrup

1 tsp. vanilla

Directions In a heavy medium saucepan, combine sugar, and cocoa powder. Stir in butter and buttermilk. Add bittersweet chocolate. Cook and stir over medium heat until chocolate is melted and mixture is smooth. Stir in whipping cream and corn syrup. Cook and stir over medium heat for 4 to 6 minutes or until mixture just boils around edges. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla. Cool slightly. Serve warm over ice cream. (Cover and chill any leftovers for up to 3 days. Sauce may also be frozen in a freezer container up to 1 month. Thaw before serving. To reheat sauce in your microwave oven, allow 60 seconds on high power for each cup, stirring once.) Makes about 3 cups.
