Creativity in the Kitchen

Angus Juniors share the story of Certified Angus Beef® during Auxiliary sponsored competition.

During the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS), pop culture characters were seen milling around the exhibition hall; The Golden Girls and Justin Bieber mingled with Olympian Shaun White and some students from Hogwarts School of Witch-



craft and Wizardry. The juniors in these costumes competed in the All-American Certified Angus Beef® Cook-Off on July 8 in Indianapolis, Ind.

The contest, sponsored by the American Angus Auxiliary and Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB), is one of the most popular events at the NJAS. Participants prepare a CAB recipe, and skit that promotes the product to consumers. Teams may consist of two to six juniors, and are divided by age and type of beef used in the recipe: steak, roast or ground beef.

"Year after year, we are always impressed by our Angus youth participating in the Cook-Off," says Anne Lampe, co-chair of the competition. "The Angus breed and the CAB brand is fortunate to have such a strong future in the National Junior Angus Association members."

As teams vie to present the best recipe and most entertaining



skit, they test their beef industry knowledge outside of the showring. The competition was fierce this year with 32 teams, but lighthearted banter and loud laughter could be heard throughout the competition area. We are doing the CAB cook-off and you basically put a skit together with a bunch of kids from your state, and you use that to inform people about Certified Angus Beef®," says Karisa Pfeiffer, Orlando, Okla.

In each age division — junior, ages 9-13; intermediate, ages 14-17; and senior,

ages 18-21 — and beef category, teams are judged on their recipes and

showmanship. Recipes are evaluated on taste and ease of preparation, while the showmanship criteria are presentation, costumes and creativity. Winners in each evaluation type, as well as an overall winner, are chosen.

CAB Lettuce Wraps

- Wraps 1 ½ pounds CAB ground beef, lean
- 3 Tbs. chopped onions 1 tsp. minced garlic
- 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- 1 cup water chestnuts, chopped
- 2/3 cup mushrooms (optional)
- Chow mein noodles (optional)
- 1 head lettuce, romaine

To prepare wraps:

- 1. Brown ground beef with garlic, onion and black pepper until meat is no longer pink.
- Add chopped water chestnuts and mushrooms (if using), and 2. cook until water chestnuts are warm and mushrooms are tender.
- Prepare the stir-fry sauce by mixing the soy sauce, brown sugar, 3. water, cornstarch and ginger together in a small bowl.
- Add the stir-fry sauce to the pan and sauté the mixture for a 4. couple of minutes; then serve it in the lettuce "wrap" with chow mein noodles for extra crunch.

Beyond the Barn

Food For Thought

What has happened to all the "ordinary" foods I used to buy? The shelves at my local grocery store are changing, leaving me searching for my affordable favorites. Food items with labeling that includes, gluten free, organic, natural, cage free and GMO free are occupying more and more space. I find myself up in arms while looking at the sticker prices for these particular items as they are 25% to 40% higher than the traditional brands I had been purchasing.

Let me make it clear, I'm all in favor of a variety of options. Out of necessity I look for

gluten free items. The amount of GF foods available has increased since I was diagnosed with Celiac Sprue Disease and I am thankful for that. The growth however was due largely because it is a "food fad". A 2012 survey conducted by the NPD Group, a market research firm, found that nearly a third of US adults say they're trying to eliminate or cut back on gluten. The gluten-free movement was listed as the #2 food trend in 2012 and has generated an escalating food industry valued at over \$4 billion and climbing. And on average, GF foods were 24% higher in price than the food versions containing gluten.

An increasingly growing number of consumers are willing to pay the additional money for specifically grown foods. The cost of environmental harm and long-term health risks are the leading reason that a growing number of consumers are purchasing organic. Many claim that organically grown food have better taste, color and flavor. Humane treatment is another leading reason for an increasing number of consumers as evident in products labeled as range-free, cage-free and pasture raised.

The debate over GMO labeling and the safety of genetically modified foods is a hot issue. GMOs reduce soil-damaging tillage, reduce carbon emissions, reduce insecticide use and the use of most toxic herbicides. The development of GMOs that have a better way of doing photosynthesis and self-fertilizing may help meet an estimated need to grow 70% more food by 2050. Safe or not, consumers are interested in what is in their food, including GMOs.

Admittedly, I have a strong interest in many of the concerns raised by consumers. The humane treatment of animals, meeting nutritional needs and environmental stewardship are practiced everyday on our ranch. And I feel blessed to live in a country that offers a variety of choices. I do worry at times though that our consumers do not fully understand the reasoning behind foods such as gluten free and these "food fads" will continue to threaten our ways of production and continue to add unnecessary costs to the producer. It is my hope that we can continue to educate our consumers and one day everyone that enjoys a steak or hamburger understands why vaccinations and our methods of production are necessary in our mission to feed the world. As for me, I just want to be able to choose my affordable, plain, no frills food items as well and gluten free items without the hype and the added cost.
