Her mother, Bette Votaw, was a charter member and served as president of the Auxiliary. In 2012 Bette was awarded the Auxiliary's Distinguished Woman Award. Kathy Votaw Dubbs, Kerri's sister was the 1973 Miss American Angus and sister, Chris Votaw Vinton was awarded the Auxiliary's 2nd place scholarship. Kerri and her husband, Steven, supported their three children as they showed cattle and participated in contests at several National Junior Angus Shows.

The role of the Votaw's in Angus history does not end with Auxiliary and junior activities. Kerri's father, Eli Votaw was elected to the American Angus Board of Directors in 1975. While serving his two terms on the board, he was instrumental in establishing the internationally recognized Certified Angus Beef®. In 1999 Eli and Bette were inducted into the Angus Heritage Foundation for their contributions to the improvement and advancement of Angus in the United States.
