Swinging for the Fences

Angus juniors receive Auxiliary scholarships during "A League of Our Own" in Louisville, Ky.

The American Angus Auxiliary and its supporters helped 10 qualifying junior Angus members swing for the fences when they announced the winners of \$12,000 in scholarships during the 2012 National Junior Angus Show (NJAS) in Louisville, Ky., July 20.

The Auxiliary awards scholarships annually to five qualifying young men and five qualifying young women, chosen this year from among 20 applicants representing 16 states. To qualify for one of the scholarships, applicants must be National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members and graduating high school seniors nominated by their state or regional associations.

Applications are due in May, and winners are announced during the NJAS Awards Ceremony. The Auxiliary has awarded these scholarships for more than 50 years.

The recipients for 2012 are:

Corbin Yon

Corbin Yon, Ridge Spring, S.C., is the firstplace winner of the young men's scholarship and will receive \$1,400.

Corbin, voted "Most Likely to Succeed"



by his fellow graduates of Ridge Spring-Moneta High School, is the son of Kevin and Lydia Yon. As the youngest of three children, Corbin says he didn't have a lot of opportunity to exhibit leadership

at the family's farm until his older siblings left for college two years ago.

"Part of that is because, like older siblings do, they were always bossing me around, but in their absence it was often a necessity that I step up at the farm," he says. "I am very involved in the day-to-day activities on the farm, such as checking, feeding, hay and silage production, fencing and grazing management."

In addition to his responsibilities at the family farm, Corbin served as team captain of his high school baseball and football teams. He completed 90 hours of training to become a full member of the Ridge Spring Volunteer Fire Department.

Corbin has participated in 4-H judging competitions for 10 years, and was a member of the 2010 team that won first place at the state competition and was able to continue to the national event.

"This will sound strange," Corbin says, "but I count the development of my work ethic and knowing the importance of responsibility as one of my personal Angus accomplishments, much more so than any award or ribbon I have won."

Corbin's main career goal after graduating from college is to return to the family farm and help in its management and expansion.

"An ambition that I have in the far future is to raise my children in the same manner [in which] I was raised," Corbin says.

Cody Theis

Cody Theis, Leavenworth, Kan., is the second-place winner of the young men's scholarship and will receive \$1,300.

Cody has been active as president of the Happy Hollow 4-H Club for two years; president of the Northeast Kansas Junior Angus Association for four years; and district director, reporter and membership director of the Kansas Junior Angus Association.

Successful in the showring at the state, regional and national level, Cody most recently showed the reserve grand champion bred-and-owned bull in the 2012 Kansas Futurity Junior Show. He has attended Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) and Raising the Bar conferences, and has been successful in livestock judging as a member of the Pleasant Ridge FFA.

Growing up on a diversified family farming operation that involves crop production, a farrow-to-finish swine operation and a registered Angus cow herd, Cody has been actively involved in all three of these phases of production agriculture. "For the past few years I have been responsible for show cattle selection, breaking, feeding and daily care," Cody



says. "I assist in the vaccination process, estrous detection, sire selection and daily care and feeding in the cattle operation in addition to my show cattle responsibilities." The graduate of

Pleasant Ridge High School will pursue a degree in animal science from Kansas State University with a minor in pre-pharmacy this fall. He plans to attend pharmacy school at the University of Kansas.

"If I pursue a career in pharmacy, I plan to remain active in agriculture by maintaining my Angus cow herd," Cody says. "I want to emphasize the show cattle segment and help Angus youth with their heifer projects and encourage them to participate in as many NJAS contests and activities as possible."

Leo Kruse

Leo Kruse, Rudd, Iowa, is the third-place winner of the young men's scholarship and will receive \$1,200.

Leo, the son of Terry and Allison Kruse, has been a member of the Rocky Ramblers



4-H Club for nine years, serving as president for two years and serving as reporter, treasurer and president of the Osage FFA chapter during his four years of membership. Successful in

county, state, regional and national levels, Leo showed the grand champion steer at the

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2007 NJAS and the grand champion bredand-owned heifer at the 2008 NJAS.

"I am a competitor at heart, and everything I do I strive to win," Leo says. "I'd never felt so rewarded for all of the rinsing, brushing and blowing until 2007, when I won grand champion steer at junior nationals in Oklahoma."

Leo has also been successful in FFA livestock judging, placing first (in a tie) and fourth overall in the 2011 state contest. He has been a member of the Iowa Junior Angus Association since 2002, a member of the Iowa Angus Association since 2008 and a member and officer of the North Central and Northeast Iowa Junior Angus associations, serving as secretary and a worker for the team hosting the 2008 NJAS in Iowa. Leo has been a member of the Iowa Junior Beef Breeds Association, representing the Angus breed for four years.

In addition to showing at NJAS, Leo has participated in the quiz bowl, livestock judging, mentoring and photo contests, and he was part of the team that placed first in team fitting in 2009.

"Growing up around cattle has given me many experiences all the way from preparing heifers for shows to pulling calves in January," Leo says. "At times it seems like a lot of work, but I wouldn't trade it for the world."

Jacob Heimsoth

Jacob Heimsoth, son of Scott and Rebecca Heimsoth, Cameron, Mo., received the fourth place scholarship and \$1,100.

Jacob, a graduate of Lathrop High School



and four-year varsity golf team member, has been involved in the FFA since 2008, has been a member of the Quad County Cattlemen, Clinton County 4-H Council, Lathrop 4-H Chapter, Missouri Junior

Cattlemen, and vice president and president of the Keystone Willing Workers 4-H Club.

He has had success at local, state and national shows, and has competed in the quiz bowl, cook-off and team fitting contests at the NJAS.

"I have been involved in the Angus business my entire life," Jacob says. "I am involved in breeding, nutrition and management of our herds on a daily basis."

Jacob plans to attend Northwest Missouri State University to obtain a degree in agriculture science. He is interested in the production side of the industry and would like to learn more about artificial insemination (AI), embryo transfer (ET), ultrasound technology and all they have to offer, for his own herd and those of others.

"My Angus cattle career started at a very young age," Jacob says. "I was extremely small and very shy. I wish I could thank each and every person who took me by the shoulder as I walked out of my class in last place and told me that I did a good job and to keep working hard.

"I will be an advocate for the beef industry by positively promoting it to consumers. I feel beef safety, production techniques, animal care, environmental stewardship and nutrition are all important areas that people need to learn about and understand so there is no question that we as producers are providing quality products while maintaining our ethics and environment," Jacob adds.

Joshua Scott

Joshua Scott, Loranger, La., is the fifthplace winner of the young men's scholarship and will receive \$1,000.

Joshua, the son of Julius and Monette



Scott, plans to get a degree in agronomy and/or animal nutrition and work for a milling co-op as a sales and service representative working on feed rations and fertilizer mixes, and, maybe, as a regional

manager for the American Angus Association someday.

Joshua earned second place in the NJAA/ Angus Journal photography contest in his age division at the NJAS in 2007, 2008 and 2010, and took first place in 2011 for his photos in the Around the Farm or Ranch and People divisions.

He also sees himself working on his family's Angus farm and continuing to show cattle. Joshua has been very successful in the showring on the state and national level, showing the third-place owned heifer and being a member of the first-place herdsmanship team for 16-30 head from Louisiana at the 2011 NJAS in Harrisburg, Pa. "I am currently working with my FFA chapter on a livestock judging team, serving as the coach for the beef portion of the contests," he says. "I would never have been able to serve in such a capacity if it were not for my own Angus cattle and showring experiences."

A member of the Louisiana Junior Angus Association (LJAA) since 2008, Joshua decided three years ago to sponsor a special Friendship Award to be presented every year during the LJAA banquet that is in conjunction with the Louisiana State University (LSU) State Livestock Show.

"With help from my family, I created a simple nomination application that fellow LJAA members can complete and submit to nominate an LJAA member that they have observed being a great leader and friend to fellow juniors," Joshua says. "I plan to continue this award even after my graduation in 2012."

Lauren Grimes

Lauren Grimes, daughter of John and Joanie Grimes, Hillsboro, Ohio, is the first-place winner of the young women's



scholarship and will receive \$1,400.

Lauren, a successful showman at all levels, showed the grand champion bred-and-owned heifer at the 2005 Ohio Junior Angus Preview Show, the 2006 Ohio State Fair

and the 2009 Ohio Junior Angus Preview Show. She showed the grand champion Angus heifer at the 2010 and 2011 North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE), and was champion senior showman at the 2011 Ohio State Fair.

"Over the years I have learned that I have a knack for helping and leading others," Lauren says. "I always make sure to pay special attention to the quiet kids who are always off by themselves, mainly because I used to be one of them. I like to help them because I know how they feel, and a leader I once knew took the time to help me."

Through the years, Lauren has participated in the NJAS quiz bowl, poster, livestock judging, photography, team fitting, team sales, prepared public speaking and cook-off contests.

She plans to attend Texas Tech University and major in agricultural communications, minoring in Spanish and agricultural economics with an emphasis in political science.

"I am very interested in working in Washington, D.C., after college for a lobbyist in order to utilize my ranching background and agricultural upbringing for the betterment of our industry," Tylee Jo says. "As a nation we may feed the world, but the world doesn't always appreciate that fact, nor do they want to recognize the importance of agriculture. I want to help correct that, and working in the political arena is a way to do it."
